The Louisiana WIC Conference held on May 20 was a major success! The conference was attended far and wide with over 400 attendees representing Louisiana's 9 regions.



Abbott Formula Recall



The 2022 Abbott Nutrition formula recall continues to greatly impact WIC families and staff. To date, Louisiana WIC has added 89 allowable formula substitutions to the approved product list in response to the recall, including RTF options and products from other brands such as Enfamil and Good Start, store brand products and larger canned products.

At this time, Louisiana WIC has waivers in place to accept the substitutions until August 31. We will continue to do all that we can to allow our WIC participants as much flexibility as possible.

WIChealth.org - New Client Search Features

Staff will also have the ability to reset locked accounts and edit account Family ID number, clinic and email address. Staff will only have access to edit and search for clients assigned to their clinic.

Research Study on Reducing Risk of Diabetes in Women

Louisiana WIC is working on a research project with Tulane University, focused on different approaches for delivering an intervention concentrated on healthy eating and exercise to women who use WIC services and recently had gestational diabetes (GDM). This project is based on the Diabetes Prevention Program, and includes a survey for postpartum women with a history of gestational diabetes.

Last month, State Agency shared information about the research study and survey with WIC participants via text messaging. Clinics may also share information about the survey with WIC participants. Women who are eligible and complete the survey, which takes approximately 30 minutes, will receive a \$25 gift card from the study. Clinic Participation in the Research Study

Based on information learned from surveys and other ongoing preliminary work and testing, Tulane is developing a one-year intervention based on the Diabetes Prevention Program for postpartum women with a history of GDM who use WIC services. The Diabetes Prevention Program is a 12-month program led by health coaches focused on healthy eating, exercise and moderate weight loss that has been shown to reduce risk of diabetes.

A randomized trial will be conducted to test this intervention in WIC clinics throughout Louisiana. We aim to recruit approximately 10 WIC participants from each participating WIC clinic over a one- to two-year period that which would start in fall 2022 or winter 2023. The long-term goal of this project is that, if effective, acceptable and feasible, this intervention could be implemented and made available for WIC participants with a history of GDM in Louisiana and other states.

The Tulane team would like to speak with WIC clinics that may be interested in partnering on this project. The project would provide funding and resources for any participating clinics. Breastfeeding Peer Counselor Program Spotlight

Monique recently was able to solve a mom's problem with her hospital-grade pump from WIC. A mother from St. John clinic delivered at 35 weeks at Woman's Hospital in Baton Rouge. The hospital LC filled out the request for a hospital-grade pump for this mom, and St. John PHU issued mom a pump during her recertification appointment and referred to Monique for continued lactation support. A week later, the hospital LC emailed again, asking for assistance in troubleshooting this pump, since the mother reported that the WIC hospital-grade pump's suction was weak. In no time, Monique had figured out that the mom was using too large of a flange size, because the mom thought the flange size was equivalent to breast size. Mom immediately was able to increase the amount of breastmilk pumped for her baby by 20 ml! Baby is now home with mom and thriving with lots of breastmilk. Of course, Monique is checking on mom and baby regularly, and will continue to help her along her breastfeeding journey.

Saeda Salim

May's Cheers for Peers goes to Saeda Salim. In just one year as a peer counselor, Saeda has mastered meeting WIC participants where they are. She has even come up with creative conversational games to get moms to think differently about their barriers to breastfeeding. Saeda also has the added bonus that she is fluent in Arabic. Saeda recently received a call from an Arabic-speaking WIC mom who received her contact information at a party from another WIC mom who encouraged her to reach out to Saeda for WIC and breastfeeding support. Word travels fast, especially amongst our WIC moms with language barriers!

Saeda has built lasting connections with her moms, including one mom whom she's been speaking with for about a year now. Mom had many struggles with breastfeeding, even had to formula feed for a time, but with Saeda's support, mom and baby are 10 months breastfeeding strong. Saeda shared, "Even though they have graduated from the PC program, she still sends me bi-monthly pictures and updates on his milestones. Being her peer counselor and hearing her during her weakest points, and praising her during the strongest points in life turned us into mother sisters. Supporting each other in the best moments of life ..." Way to go, Saeda!

Announcements

Three-Month Issuance Returns

Beginning July 1, 2022 LA WIC will revert back to only issuing three months of benefits. Since March 2020 we have been issuing four months of benefits to provide participants more flexibility due to COVID-19. As businesses have opened back up and vaccine rates have risen, LA WIC is opting to return to normal issuance to best align with the certification appointments and nutrition education requirements. Note that we will still have the physical presence waiver, and clinics will still have the option of operating via curbside, in-person or a hybrid model. More information will be available for staff on the June 30 policy webinar, via the LMS, and a training bulletin.
